ard Sunday in Lent March 3

The liturgy for the 3rd Sunday of Lent invites us to contemplate the Gospel scene often called the "purification" or cleansing of the Temple. The other evangelists show us this event taking place during Jesus' final week in Jerusalem, when he brings to fulfilment the mission he had received from the Father, while John places it at the beginning of Jesus' public ministry.

By driving the sellers and money-changers out of the Temple, Jesus recalls the prophetic words of Zechariah: "there shall no longer be a trader in the house of the Lord of hosts on that day" (Zech 14:21). The Jews who witnessed this dramatic event realized it was a symbolic gesture, and asked for

a sign to show he is acting in God's name and power, as a true prophet.

Jesus offers a sign that no other prophet could: the Cross and Resurrection. "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The meaning of these words will be revealed only at the Resurrection, when the disciples "remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word which Jesus had spoken."

Jesus' Cross and Resurrection will open a new way to worship God. The place for encountering God will no longer be the Temple but the risen and glorified Body of Jesus in the sacrament of the Holy Eucharist, where all mankind is united.

A few chapters later in John's gospel, Jesus will tell the Samaritan woman: "believe me, the hour is coming when neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem will you worship the Father ... the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for such the Father seeks to worship him" (*Jn* 4:21-23).

Saint Paul refers to this new form of worship when he says "you are God's temple" (1 Cor 3:16), and above all when he exhorts Christians to offer their bodies as a living sacrifice that is holy and acceptable to God (cf. Rom 12:1). In this new "spiritual worship," those united to Christ adore and give glory to the living God.

After the cleansing of the Temple, the evangelist says that "many believed in his name when they saw the signs which he did," but that Jesus did not trust himself to them because he "knew what was in man."

Jesus' purification of the Temple reminds us today of the need to purify our faith, to once again ground our life on the God who shows us his power and infinite love on the Cross, the source of our salvation. Only by passing through the Cross will we reach the glory and joy of the Resurrection.

Come Back to Me....

While reconciliation is what God does, receiving it and celebrating

it are what we do. For Catholics, the sacrament of reconciliation is a most natural way to celebrate God's reconciliation. We used to think of this sacrament as only about confession—it was like a dumping ground for our sins where we were forgiven and had to pay a toll. One of the great recoveries in our Christian history is the rediscovery of the meaning of this sacrament.

It is God who forgives sins. God forgives us the very moment we realize we need forgiveness, which itself comes through God's grace. At that moment, we feel sorrow and a desire for forgiveness and healing, and we are reconciled with God. The reunion, the bond, the connection, and the joy are all there. Three more things remain: forgiveness and healing deep within our heart, celebration of that forgiveness, and participation in the healing process.

When I experience God's forgiveness and love, I am touched deeply. Experiencing compassion,

patience, understanding, and forgiveness is itself transforming. If I fail to appreciate what I have just received freely and undeservedly, then I will take it for granted and risk moving on without real healing.

We need to celebrate the reconciliation we have received. In the sacrament of reconciliationindividually or in common—we have the wonderful opportunity to ritualize that celebration. In the sacrament, our personal journey is joined with the mystery of God's saving love, as seen in the Scriptures and in God's desire to save us all. This is deeply personal. There, in ritual form, even if it is just us and the priest, we step forward and admit that we are sinners, express our sorrow, and name the places in our life where God is shining a light into what we have done and what we have failed to do. Then God's forgiveness is proclaimed out loud for us to hear and rejoice in: "May God give you pardon and peace."

Part of the sacrament of reconciliation is healing. Often that will simply be prayer. Often expressing our gratitude to God is one of the most important steps on the road to recovery from our independence from God. Sometimes, we will need to practice a therapy that is more carefully focused on making choices about what I can practice doing and what I can practice avoiding.
